One of the most iconic¹ artists of the 20th century, Pablo Picasso had a long, amazing career. Over the years, his style changed greatly, shifting from realistic¹ to abstract. Understanding Picasso and his art can be hard. Luckily, though, his works sinclude several self-portraits², which give us clues³ about his changing views on life and art.
 Picasso's first portrait dates back to¹ 1896, when he was just 15. It shows a realistic-looking young man with a serious expression on his face.
 One can see that he clearly has no shortage of² talent⁴, although his art is not yet very original⁵.

A few years later, we start to see signs of his gift. By 1907, Picasso had been living in Paris for three years. At the time, African masks and sculptures⁶ were <u>all the rage³</u> in Paris. His self-portrait from that year shows this influence ¹⁵ clearly. His face is sharp and mask-like. The wide eyes and nose look almost like geometric shapes². The **seeds** of cubism³, the art style that would make him famous a few years later, are **plainly**⁷ there for all to see.

Picasso painted few self-portraits during his thirties and forties, but he returned to them more and more as he grew older. These later works are far more abstract than his earlier ones. They show his face in profile⁴ but with all his features visible⁸, or show his body as a simple, strangely shaped outline⁹. In 1972, a year before his death, he drew himself over and over as a huge, asymmetrical⁵ rock-like head with wide, scared eyes. Perhaps he thought it better showed us his true inner¹⁰ self.

Of all his works, Picasso's self-portraits give us the best **insight**¹¹ into the great man's mind. If he hadn't painted so many, we wouldn't have gotten such an important **visual**¹² record of his artistic and personal **evolution**¹³.

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Reading Skill Sequence of Events

In any article, a writer might refer to several events that are relevant to the topic. Sometimes, the writer will present these events in order, from earliest to latest, but not always. As a result, it is important to be able to recognize **the order** in which these events took place.

By recognizing the sequence of events, readers can better understand **how events unfold in chronological order**. Readers can also make connections between different parts of the passage. (However, note that the sequence of events does not indicate causation. We need to carefully consider whether or not the author suggests any cause-and-effect relationships between events.)

To identify the sequence of events, readers should pay attention to **specific words and phrases** that indicate **time**. These could be specific days, months, or years. Or they could be words such as **before**, **after**, **first**, **next**, **then**, or **later**. These words and phrases can give important clues about the order in which the events occurred. Consult the following table for some common words/phrases indicating time:

Words/Phrases	Examples
before, after	 I locked all the windows before I went to bed.
first, next, then, later, finally	 Sarah first sliced a piece of cake, then poured a cup of tea, and finally sat down to enjoy her teatime.
previously	 The building was previously used as a factory, but now it is a museum.
eventually	 After hours of searching, they eventually found the keys in the kitchen.
as soon as	• As soon as the rain stopped, we went outside for a walk.
